Pillowcase

The companion pillowcase is made following the directions found on the QUILT Magazine website at www.quiltmag.com/sewing-projects/pillow-cases

The “1/3 yard print fabric for folded end” is replaced by (7) 6” finished hourglass blocks. If you saved the extra block when making the quilt, you only need to make 6 more hourglass blocks. Otherwise, make all seven. Use the pink fabric for the contrasting trim and the blue floral fabric for the bottom of the pillowcase.

1. To make (6) 6½” hourglass blocks use (3) 8” lime green squares and (3) 8” blue lattice squares. If you need the full 7 blocks, start with (4) 8” lime green squares and (4) 8” blue lattice squares. You will have one extra block.
2. Follow the quilt block instructions to make the necessary number of 6½” hourglass blocks.
3. Continue with the website directions to finish the pillowcase.

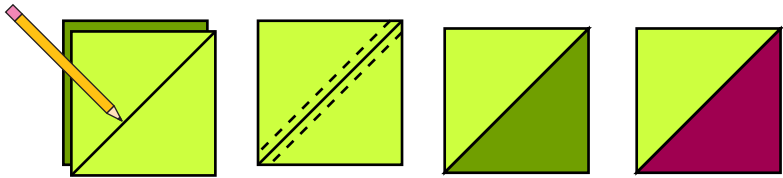
Bed Organizer

Materials You Will Need:

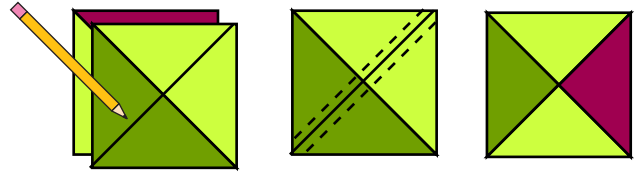
- (1) 11” blue floral square
- (1) 11” lime green square
- (1) 9-1/2” x 56” strip of floral border fabric

Sewing Directions: *(Seam allowance is 1/4" unless stated otherwise)*

Refer to quilt block instructions, make (1) 9½" hourglass block using (1) 11" blue floral square and (1) 11" lime green square.

Sew the hourglass block to one of the short sides of the 9-1/2" x 56" strip of the floral border fabric.

Fold the pieced strip in half with right sides together so that you have a 9½" x 32½" strip. Sew along both long sides of the strip. Turn the tube inside out.

At the open edge, fold in the raw edges and stitch. Iron the strip.

Fold the block end of the strip so that the block faces out and the pocket is formed.

Sew along the two outside edges of the block, backstitching at the beginning and at the end to reinforce the seams. The top end is left open to form the pocket.
